t this time of year we like to check in with some of our sports teams and activities and see what has been going on around the school. This term we will be catching with our Archers, our 8-Ball Snooker Team and our Senior Premier Basketball team to see how their year has been.

ARCHERY

n 2015, the HBHS Archers met regularly Ifor target shooting practice at Graham Park. In Term 1, a number of novice archers completed the introductory course provided by our coach Daniel Oosterwijk; this enabled them to take advantage of regular training opportunities for the remainder of the year. We have been extremely fortunate to have ongoing support and expert guidance from Daniel and his father Ron. An Old Boy of HBHS and past Captain of Archery, Daniel again won a National title in Archery this year. He has encouraged younger archers throughout the year, sharing valuable technical advice.

Our archers have participated in postal shoot competitions for secondary school students, achieving fine results both in individual and in team events. Some highlights include: In Term 1, Corbin Andrew was placed third nationally at secondary school level in the Limited Recurve section (male division), while Ben Lawrence was placed eighth, and Thomas Cook was tenth. As a team, these three students were ranked second at national level.

In Term 2, Sashith Fernando, Corbin Andrew and Fraser Ogle achieved fifth, seventh and eighth rankings respectively for the Limited Recurve section (male division). They were ranked fourth in the Limited Recurve team division.

In Term 3, Corbin Andrew was placed sixth nationally in the Limited Recurve section (male division), while Thomas Cook was ranked tenth. Caeden Bright joined the team for this event, and they achieved a ranking of fifth nationally. In the Open Recurve section, Scot Ashton was placed

This is the first year that HBHS has been able to field teams in this competition, and it has been encouraging to see our archers achieve at a consistently high level.

Students who are interested in joining Archery in 2016 are strongly encouraged to do so. Please note that all new archers must complete a beginner's course before joining us for target shooting as this is a safety

requirement.

SENIOR PREMIER BASKETBALL 2015

he senior basketball season started off with a large group of boys all wanting their chance to represent our school and pull on the Lion's singlet. We then played off against the best schools in the region and managed through a lot of hard work, commitment and time throughout the whole year, to come third, beating our rival St John's.

The Zone 2 Regional competition was held in Rotorua and with this being the qualifying tournament, the whole team was ready to give it everything and knew that nothing was going to come easy:

Game 1: After an extremely physical and tiring encounter against MacLeans College we came away with our first win: 81 – 69

Game 2: Te Awamutu College proved too much for us and our first loss of the tournament really got us down: 107 - 94 Te

Game 3: After recovering from the night before, a good performance was put in to defeat Te Puke: 98 – 57 Lions

Game 4: The game which decided who made top 8. With everything on the line and a history of close matches against Tauranga Boys' College we came through to win: 93 -70 Lions

Game 5: Playing the eventual second place getters for a chance to make top 4 and guarantee a Nationals spot Rotorua Boys' sadly proved too much: 91 - 67 RBHS

Game 6: With the luck going against us, we

were unable to overcome a strong team: 100 - 87 St John's College

Game 7: The team dug deep and managed to overcome a well-drilled Hauraki Plains team to come up one place short of a trip to Nationals: 87 - 65 Lions

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he Senior Prizegiving is the biggest and most important event in our school year, as we acknowledge and celebrate the academic achievements of our senior school. In our final visit to the International Students Centre this year, we had the opportunity to catch up with Year 10 students Milan Thoma and Deco Pharanhok, both of whom arrived at HBHS this year (Milan in July and Deco in October).

Milan and Deco are from very different countries in different parts of the world, but once we got chatting, the similarities in terms of experiences quickly emerged. Milan, who is returning home in two weeks' time, is from Bonn in Germany, a relatively small city (by German standards) of 450 000, about twice the size of Hamilton. Deco calls Vientiane home, the capital city of Laos which has a population of about 1 million and a lot of traffic jams, which he definitely doesn't miss! His former school is government-run and was the first school founded in the city with a roll of 3000 students, it is co-ed, as is Milan's school, or "gymnasium", which in the German education system is the most advanced of the three levels of secondary schools which children qualify for after leaving primary school. Both have found HBHS stricter than their former schools and Milan has also had to get used to wearing a uniform as well as driving on the left hand side of the road, which led to a near disaster

on his first day of biking to school. **Milan** rode on the wrong side of the road minus a helmet (which are not required by law in Germany) and as a result had his first and only encounter with the New Zealand police force. Fortunately, once explanations were made, he was allowed on his way, but he is quite emphatic about how challenging it is to get used to traffic going the opposite way. **Deco** didn't have to worry about cycling, as in Laos is it legal to drive at 15 in order to get to school, but they also drive on the right.

Both have relished the chance to learn English, and both speak it very well, but they certainly found the first few weeks difficult, especially with the speed at which New Zealanders talk. Their advice to us? Please slow down, at least to begin with! In terms of cultural differences, Milan has found New Zealand very interesting, because the differences with Germany are quite subtle, but they are there and he has enjoyed navigating his way through these. For **Deco**, New Zealand is very different. As an example, Christmas is not celebrated in Laos. The major holiday is the Laotian New Year or Pimai Lao which is one of the most important dates in the Lao calendar.

As well as being a time of celebration and endless fun, It has also become synonymous with holiday, the celebration of Lao identity, the reinforcement of family bonds and an opportunity to reflect on the year ahead. Deco is the middle child of three; his mother is a doctor and his father the deputy director of an electrical company. Milan is the eldest of four; his mother is a film producer in Cologne and his father an accountant in Bonn. Milan's mother actually studied at Waikato University, which is one of the reasons why Hamilton as an overseas option was considered. Deco also has family connections with Hamilton via an aunt and uncle. The boys were unanimous when asked about the value of studying overseas and their experiences. Deco was emphatic, he believes it is essential to get out of your country and experience another culture and Milan wholeheartedly agreed.

We thank them both for being so willing to share their experiences and wish **Milan** safe travels back to Germany. **Deco** we will see for quite some time, as he intends to complete his education here and he is delighted to have been given this opportunity, as are we to have him here.

STOP THE PRESS!

Special Feature on a Voyage to the Auckland Islands. Teacher in Charge of Sailing Mr Jeremy Tizard reports on his recent sailing adventure to the sub Antarctic Auckland Islands: In November the Sir Peter Blake Trust gave me an amazing opportunity to accompany five other volunteers and Department of Conservation staff on the 25 metre yacht "Evolve" sailing to the Auckland Islands some 460km south of Bluff. The purpose of the trip was to assist DOC staff in monitoring the population of the vulnerable Yellow-Eyed Penguin, the fourth tallest of the world's penguin species. Days usually began with a 4am wake-up call, but sometimes it was as early as 2am if there was some distance to travel. After jumping ashore from a zodiac, we walked across an island to be dropped off at an isolated spot by 5am to monitor penguins entering the water. We experienced high winds, rain, hail and even snow on the hill tops during our early morning counts. We also enjoyed periods of fine weather, all parts of a very changeable Southern Ocean climate. This is a wild place where an albatross or giant petrel may fly over your head or an endangered Hooker's Sea Lion would challenge intruders! Unlike other penguin species, Yellow-Eyed Penguins or YEP's nest out of sight of other birds, hidden away in coastal forest, tussock or scrub land. They are very cautious, usually only entering the water after they have spent some time checking there are no sea lions lurking around. I encountered significantly more penguins on Enderby Island, which is now free of introduced pests, unlike the Auckland Islands where pigs and cats are still threats. The difference provides a striking example of the results of pest eradication programmes by DOC. Enderby Island also boasts Southern Royal Albatross nests amongst large areas of flowering "megaherbs" which have recovered since cattle and rabbits were removed. Eastern valleys on these volcanic islands have been carved by glaciers while the cliffs of the Western coast have been pounded by Southern Ocean waves. Small waterfalls on the exposed Northern coast of Enderby Island defy gravity and spray upwards due to the high winds powering up the cliff faces. Southern Right Whales visit the Auckland Islands to breed (Google "National Geographic Southern Right Whale images" for some incredible photos).

This is truly a wild and wonderful place which defies superlatives to describe rare plant and animal life in a freezing, windblown and unforgiving landscape. It is a place of fascinating geology, a place with a history of Māori and Moriori presence, of shipwrecks, WWII coastal lookouts and an abandoned settlement that dates back to the 1850's. My thanks to the Sir Peter Blake Trust, the Department of Conservation and to the very capable captain and crew of the "Evolve". It was a great privilege to sail there and gain experiences which will enrich my teaching in the years to come.
