




# **School Newsletter**

## Message from the Headmaster

Dear Parents,

After a very busy term, it is timely to reflect upon the successes and achievements of the past three months, and to reflect, also, on those qualities which make the world of Hamilton Boys' High School so special.



The word love is used in so many ways. I am asked often, why we are such a special school, and my response invariably includes the word love. In ancient Greece, there were many words for love, and at Hamilton Boys', three of these are so important. What was so evident to me, at Lake Ruataniwha, and what is so clear to us all, every day, is that we recognise agape, philia and storge, as critical components of what we are crafting in the young men who make this world so unique.

Agape is the love we feel for our children, the recognition of how important it is to live for others as well as for oneself, and to serve. This type of love was further explained by Thomas Aquinas as "to will the good of another". Agape is used in the Christian faith to express the unconditional love of God for man. The second 'love' is Philia, which is defined as "affectionate regard, or friendship". It is significant because it relates to loyalty to friends and family, the sense of brotherly love, of care for the community we are a part of. And, finally, as a school we feel a sense of Storge. This involves love and affection for one's wider family, for one's country, team or group. It is a sense of empathy, of comradeship, of belonging, and it is so important in the life of a school.

All of these aspects of love are an integral part of the life of the students and staff of Hamilton Boys' High School. We understand the importance of service, of caring for others; we recognise that we are a family, and that we care for each and every member of our community. And we are proud to be a part of this group of people that make up our world.

I saw all of these qualities in the Rowing Squad at Twizel, and I see it every day at school, in whichever class, group, or team I am with. The reason why this has been a spectacular term, in every way, is thus simple. We understand, and we feel, love, in all of the ways that matter to us. And that, in the end, is what makes me feel so very proud.

I wish all families a wonderful holiday break, and I look forward to another positive term ahead.





## **TERM 1 SPORTS ROUND UP**



s we go to print Summer Tournament Week is underway and our teams and athletes have travelled around the country to compete in Provincial and National Championships. However, there has been plenty going on already this term, and we've already had to make a lot of room in the trophy cabinet as our athletes and teams keep going about their winning ways.

At the end of last year, our Condor Sevens team won the National Sevens Rugby title, whilst our Touch team finished runners-up, in their competition, as did our Junior Softball team. The Touch side recently got one back on champions Rotorua Boys' High School by winning the Zone 3 Championships in their quest to regain the National title. Other teams to qualify for National Tournaments this term are our Junior Cricket team who won the Northern Districts competition, the combined HBHS and HGHS Ki-O-Rahi team, and our Junior and Senior Futsal teams on the back of their title-winning efforts at the Waikato Futsal Championships. Our Senior Cricket team is the Super 8 Champion once more, and our Tennis team won four Waikato Championships, with Anton Shepp winning the Junior Boys Singles title, Sebastian Kerr and Cole Northcott the Junior Doubles, Jack Portegys the Intermediate Singles and Nicholas Goodman and Harry Peploe the Intermediate Doubles title. Other Regional titles came courtesy of our Triathlon team with Danyon Hardie (swim), Noah Costar (bike) and Patrick Dowd (run) winning the Intermediate event and Liam Barton (swim), Cullen Browne (bike) and Bradley Cullen (run) winning the Senior competition.

The HBHS Athletics team won two National titles at the NZSS Championships in December and set a new National record as well. Isaiah Priddey was named as the Junior Boy Athlete of the Meet on the back

of two gold medal winning runs in the Junior 1500m and the Junior 3000m. Our other gold medal winner was Tyler Wood who won the Junior High Jump, with Christopher Goodwin winning silver in the Senior Long Jump and bronze in the Senior High Jump. Blair Pennell also won silver in the Open 2000m Steeplechase, as did Connor Tristram in the Junior 4km Road Race. Isaiah has been one to watch this term, winning the Open Men's 1500m race at the Porritt Classic in a time of 3:52.12 minutes, beating his own previous best time and setting a new record in this event for our school. He has already won the Capital Classic Under 20 1500m, the Auckland Under 20 1500m, and finished second in the New Zealand Under 20 3000m this year. Olympic silver medallist Nick Willis has identified Isaiah as a junior athlete to watch, and Isaiah recently proved this a prophetic statement, winning the John Walker Shoes after setting a new record in the Senior Boys 3000m of 8:42.47 minutes and winning the Senior Boys 1500m event at the Waikato Bay of Plenty Athletics Championships. Isaiah backed this up by winning the same distance events at the North Island Secondary Schools competition

Our three-in-a-row Maadi Cup winning Rowing Eight, who were our Team of the Year at the HBHS Sports Awards in 2015, started 2016 by winning the Secondary School Team of the Year at the Waikato Sports Awards in January. The rowing squad have carried on their winning ways in their build up towards the Maadi Cup, winning four gold and four silver medals at the New Zealand Club Championships, and followed this up at the KRI Schools Regatta with nine wins and two second places. Five of these wins were in the Under 15 category, and it is worth noting that the Under 15 Eight went on to win this event at the North Island Secondary Schools

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Regatta for the fifteenth straight til HBHS won nine events and finished third in two events with our Under 18 Eight remaining unbeaten to date.

One of the striking features of this term's sport results is the range of activities in which HBHS sportsmen are excelling. One of the newest sports, golf croquet, saw HBHS students Keegan Hansen and Lachie McIsaac finish second in the Inaugural Waikato Secondary Schools competition this term. Jaxon Waters won two gold medals in the International division in Individual Trampoline and Synchronised Trampoline at the New Zealand Championships. Boxing brothers Sean and Jarrad Smith will compete in the Australian National Golden Gloves Competition in August, and prior to this, Jarrad will compete in the Ringside World Champion Boxing Competition in the United States. James Scott will head off to Europe in May to compete for four months in the FIM Motocross World Championships as the New Zealand Junior Class Champion, and Bradley Parrott was recently named in the New Zealand Junior Shooting Squad after winning the North Island Open Championship in Junior Triples and Junior Single Barrels. Zane Neill and Daniel Sinkinson recently represented New Zealand as members of the Under 16 Junior Polocrosse team which won all four tests played against a New South Wales side. Jack Read won six National titles in the New Zealand Flat Water Canoe Sprint Championships in the Under 14 age group, taking out the K1 200m, the K1 500m, and the K1 5km event, as well as team titles in the K2 500m, the K4 500m and the K4 200m. Finally, HBHS riders managed to win four National age group BMX titles, along with a second place this Easter. Our latest National title winners are Ryan Jordan in the Under 16 event, Cailen Calkin who won the Under 15 event, Austin Lupton in the Under 13 event, and Mason James who won the Under 14 event. Jack Lupton finished in second place behind Cailen in the Under 15 Boys event. Also competing at the event were Dylan Belle, Clay Merito and Harris Thurgood. Coaching three of these riders is Old Boy Cole McOnie who competed in the World BMX Championships in Belgium last year, along with Cailen, Ryan and Clay.

This has been an outstanding term for HBHS sport, and we congratulate all of our boys on their efforts. We also thank all of our supporters, teachers, families and friends who put in countless hours to help make us so successful. Kia kaha to you all.



# SUMMER MOTOCROSS SUCCESS

Over the summer, members of the HBHS Motocross team competed at events throughout the North Island and gained some impressive results.

Late last year, James Scott (Year 10) began his season by winning the 85 class at the Auckland Championships. He continued his success by winning the same class at the annual Woodville GP and placing second in the Junior 125 class riding a smaller 85 bike fitted with a 105cc kit. James also rode his 105 to second place in the 125 class at the Rotorua Secondary School tournament and to diversify his racing, he entered and won the Raglan 1.5 hour cross country race. James is now preparing for the New Zealand Junior Motocross Championships at the end of April and the major challenge of competing in the European 150 Championship. The European Championship consists of five rounds visiting Germany, England, Belgium, Switzerland and the Netherlands. The school wishes the Scott family and James all the best for this Championship.

Cross Country racing is a very popular and successful motorcycling discipline enjoyed by members of the team. Zak Fuller (Year10) gained an impressive first place in the 85 class at the opening round of the New Zealand Cross Country Championships. Caleb Richardson (Year 10) gained a fourth place in the Cambridge 1.5 hour Cross Country and placed a creditable third in the Ironman class at the Castrol 6 hour. The Castrol 6 hour was a senior race with many riders opting to team up for the event, so for Caleb to individually race for 6 hours at 14 years of age is a great accomplishment. Seton Head (Year 10) has had a successful summer, winning the 2.5 hour Grand National Cross Country series and placing second in the 1.5 hour Bel Ray series and Cambridge Cross Country race. Seton also competed in the Woodville GP and secured a fourth place in the Junior 125 class. At the recent Rotorua Secondary School tournament Jack Bertram (Year 12) and Micheal Henry (Year 10) did an excellent job representing the school by gaining first and third place in the 250 B class.

## HAMILTON OLD BOYS' CRICKET

Hamilton Old Boys' has a long relationship with Hamilton Boys' High School. Formed in 1914, when the school was still at the current site of Hamilton Girls' High and called Hamilton High School (HHS), Old Boys' was the brainchild of a band of teachers and students wanting to have a Cricket Club of their own.

The club's founder, and first club Captain, was **Norman Jacobsen** – a Senior teacher at HHS, and coach of almost every sports team, he went on to captain New Zealand in Hockey, and play Cricket to Plunket Shield standard.

Our founding President was the first Hamilton High School Headmaster, **Eben Wilson**. His influence on cricket was huge, and was one of many initial connections between HHS and Old Boys'.

Deputy Headmaster **Whampoa Fraser**, as well as other Senior teachers such as **Roy Inder** and **Rob Roy McGregor** were part of the initial seasons of Old Boys' history, and students like **Harold Turbot** and **Lance Tompkins** were key members of the club.

This relationship between club and school carries on today. As part of our relationship with the school, Old Boys' takes care of many of the cricket facilities at HBHS, including the practise nets, grass block and artificial wickets. Old Boys' also provide coaching assistance to HBHS Junior cricket teams. Our clubrooms are located in the school Pavilion, and we maintain a close association with HBHS.

Many of Old Boys' most notable representatives – players like Mitchell Santner, BJ Watling and Anurag Verma – are former HBHS students, as are many of those in our current sides. Current Premier Captain Jono McNeill and Club Chairman Jason Perrett are also both former HBHS 1st XI Cricketers.

## THE NIWA SCIENCE PROJECT

On Tuesday February 16 six boys took part in a service opportunity at Parana Park in Hamilton. Working with NIWA (National Institute of Water and Atmospheric Research) and the New Zealand Landcare Trust, Kanj Patel, Richard Neale, Brodie Kemara, Alex Matthews, Aryan Gupta and myself built fish passes along Gibbon's Creek. The fish





passes are ramps which allow fish to navigate obstacles such as weirs, waterfalls and dams. The four new passes built in the stream are designed to encourage more whitebait into the Hamilton stream as well as facilitating in the natural migration of eels.

To build the fish passes we moved sandbags to divert the stream so that the ramps could be concreted. This took a lot of effort as the sandbags were extremely heavy and at one point the weir we were trying to place a ramp on, was on the edge of a bridge. This meant we had to crawl under the bridge and then move the sandbags with very little room available. We then found rocks of various sizes and logs to build the structure of the fish passes and to create shaded areas along the stream for the eels and fish to inhabit. The rocks we collected were then used to shape the ramp so a gentler gradient could be achieved. This allows the fish to swim upriver where they previously couldn't. The rocks were then concreted in place and smaller rocks were used to create areas

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where the fish could rest out of the full force of the stream. As well as building the ramps, we also weeded the banks and collected rubbish to improve the area so it would be a better habitat for the fish. A couple of us focused on the weeding and by the end of the day had produced a huge pile nearly as tall as any of us.

The day was a huge success as all four ramps were completed in one day when it was expected it would take two. We worked tirelessly and some of us even had to be persuaded to take a lunch break! We all learned a lot about the local ecology and native fishes in the area. We owe a big thank you to Mrs Bastion and NIWA for giving us this opportunity. Dr Cindy Baker from NIWA and Dr Bruno David from Waikato Regional Council set up the project targeting HBHS students solely and it was a pleasure to take part in this valuable learning experience.
