HBHS Old Boy James McOnie with his razor sharp wit and sometimes borderline humour then leapt guickly to the fore to invite all present to join in the fun, shake off the work week and to ponder on the impact that HBHS has had on them and the wider Hamilton community. The laughs came loud and quickly as McOnie reflected on his time at HBHS as being "a little like the Hunger Games, just grab a weapon and run". 

Dear Parents,

Message from the Headmaster

As a school, it is clear that we approach the end of Term Two with the same sense of enthusiam and purpose as we began, and for this I am grateful to everyone in our community. It has been a most successful ten weeks, in so many ways. The trophy table in our school reception, which houses only recently won prizes, is filled to overflowing, a testament to the achievements of our multi-talented sportsmen, musicians, dramatists, orators, debaters, kapa haka and scholars, to name only a few. And last week as I showed visitors

CAREERS INFORMATION

cholarships – There are literally thousands of scholarships available for those students who intend going on to tertiary study. Not all are for academic excellence, but most will require the student to have a good grade point average, as well as being able to show all round characteristics such as participation in extra curricular activities, service and leadership.

How can I find out about scholarships?

- · Check each university prospectus and go online to check out their website, most scholarships are listed there.
- Use the scholarship database, below (formerly breakout) This is available on any school based computer. The database has virtually every scholarship available in NZ. Students will be asked questions to narrow down their search. They should be looking at school leaver or undergraduate (1st year) scholarships. This does take time, so students should be starting their search now.
- Computers and assistance are available at the Careers Centre, Student Services Centre.

then click on the logo then login (no password required)

• Most scholarships tend to have closing dates, from about July to October. (Students need to check each one as there may be earlier ones)

Procedure

- Scholarship applications are done on-line .
- Students use their testimonials as the school reference.
- Students are required to register at Student Services Reception if they are applying for a scholarship and require their testimonial. They must provide the name of the scholarship and the closing date.
- Some scholarships may require a CV or have an essay component.



University enrolments

All universities will send representatives into school during September to assist students with enrolments. Students will be invited to book a time. It should take about 30mins.

Halls of Residence Applications

Applications for university accommodation open on August 1st and close on October 1st. Students are advised to apply early as it is a very competitive market.

Exception - AUT applications open on Oct 1st

Procedure

This is a two part procedure.

- Students need to apply on line, to each of their chosen Halls of Residence.
- · Once the application has been received by the university they will email Mr Summerfield (Year 13 Dean). He will then complete a confidential report on line which the universities use as part of their selection process.

In recent news, HBHS Old Boy and Head Prefect in 2013 Sam Franicevic was named as New Zealand's Best Young Guitarist at the Mercury Bay Music Festival and will head to New York to work with world-renowned guitarist Tommy Emmanuel. Our Smokefree Rockquest performers were recognised at the recent Waikato competition, with Rawiri Kapa-Hakeney and his band Sweet Amour finishing third and Ethan Aish winning the APRA lyric award.

Our Barbershop quartet of Reid Bensemen, Nicci Rich, Samisoni Baledrokadroka and Fynn Bodley-Davies went to the Waikato Young People in Harmony competition and finished second, and our Music Tour jets off in the last week of this term for their tour of Samoa, (which will be profiled in next term's High Achiever) for what will be a muchneeded dose of sunshine. We wish them all safe travel and happy performing, along with last year's Deputy Head Prefect Alex Kennedy who will head to the Globe Theatre in London in July for a chance to perform in a Shakespearean play at the home of all things Shakespearean.

THE 2016 MAADI CUP REGATTA

(a) Ape might not have brought home the big trophies from the Maadi Cup at Lake Ruataniwha, but we are very proud of our medallists and competitors who did so well at what is the largest secondary schools sporting competition in New Zealand. HBHS finished with five gold medals, three silver medals and two bronze medals, and what is distinctive about the gold medals is that all five of them were at Under 15 level, and it is the first time in the competition's history that one school has won all of the events in an age group. SUMMER TOURNAMENT **WEEK 2016**

Our HBHS Summer Sports teams ranged far and wide in April to compete for Regional and National glory in their various competitions, and we bring you a round-up of all of the competition highlights.

67 he Junior Colts Cricket team notched up two wins in the New Zealand Secondary Schools Tournament at Palmerston North, beating Hutt International College by 39 runs. HBHS were bowled out for 90 and then went on to dismiss the Hutt International team for 51 runs. They followed this up with a win over St Andrews Christchurch, bowling the St Andrews team out for 118 and then scoring 119 for the loss of 5 wickets. Unfortunately the team then lost by 8 wickets to New Plymouth Boys' High School in a low scoring match with HBHS bowled out for 56. They then suffered another loss to Auckland Grammar who notched up 270 for 4 and then bowled HBHS out for 86. In their last match the HBHS side beat John McGlashan College by 2 wickets to finish in 4th place overall. With three teams equal on 6 points each, the final position was determined on net run rate.

n the Northern Region New Zealand Secondary Schools Qualifying Tournament held in Hamilton, our 1st XI Cricket team began with a very good win over St Peter's Cambridge, setting a total of 286 for 6 and then bowling the St Peter's side out for exactly half that total to win by 143. They then faced Hillcrest High School and bowled them out for 107 before reaching 108 for the loss of 4 wickets. The team had a scare against Tauranga Boys' College in their semi-final with the Tauranga side bowled out for 71 as HBHS made hard work of the chase, getting home with 2 wickets to spare. The final against St John's College was more comprehensive, with HBHS scoring 258 for 7 and then bowling St John's out for 120. The win means HBHS will represent Northern Districts in the Top 6 National Tournament in Christchurch this December.

ur Tennis team found the competition very tough at the New Zealand Secondary Schools Tournament in Auckland, losing 6 - 0 to Auckland Grammar and by the same margin to Scots College Wellington. The team bounced back with a good 4 - 2

win against Christ's College to end up in the play-off for 7th and 8th against Wakitipu College which they unfortunately lost 6 - 0.

67 he HBHS Softball team were competing in the NZSS Division 2 Tournament in Papakura. They began with a 5 - 3 loss to Auckland Grammar and then had good wins against Tolaga Bay Area School 19 - 1, Green Bay High School 9 - 2, Tauranga Boys' College 19 - 1, Rutherford College 7 - 2, Gisborne Boys' High School 2 - 0 and Rosehill College 11 - 4. The team finished in 4th place overall, after losing 5 - 0 to St John's College in their final match.

n the NZSS Waka Ama Regatta in Rotorua, Te Wakaiti Southon finished in 5th place in the Under 19 250m Singles event. Zan Southon and Tarik Jennings both made the Plate Division in the Under 16 250m Singles event. Te Wakaiti Southon went on to win silver and bronze medals at the World Waka Ama Regatta which was an outstanding achievement, and we congratulate him on this.

The results are as follows:



n 12 April, 28 1st XV boys headed off \mathcal{J} on a "trip of a lifetime" to the UK and Ireland. After a stopover in Hong Kong and London our first stop was Belfast, in Northern Ireland. There we were billeted out to members of the team we were set to play against in our first game of the tour from the Royal Belfast Academical Institution. or tour got underway with our first game against Royal Belfast Academical Institution who had enjoyed a successful year as winners of the Northern Ireland Secondary Schools Cup. We knew it was going to be a

tough tour-opener and after a hard-fought game we edged out the Northern Irish champs 26-7 thus getting the tour off to an exciting start.

Our second game, also in Belfast, was against Ulster Select Schools and the boys were billeted out by associates of the Belfast Harlequins RFC. As a team we led a coaching session with a junior team, which was our opportunity to give something back and a good experience of trying something new. The match saw HBHS take on a large Ulster Select Schools team. It was a close start to the game, but the fitness of the HBHS team proved to be the difference and a flurry of tries in the second half saw us win the game in a comfortable fashion 38-7.

We then travelled by bus down to Dublin. Our four days in the Republic of Ireland's capital city consisted of a city tour and visits to iconic sites such as Trinity College. This college was founded in 1592 by Queen Elizabeth I making it Ireland's oldest university and was the Alma Mater of many world-renowned authors including Oscar Wilde and Bram Stoker. Then it was on to game three against the Blackrock RFC team from an area which has been traditionally

strong for many years with the college producing some of the greatest rugby players in history, including former Irish Captain Brian O'Driscoll.

Blackrock RFC Match Report:

Our third game saw HBHS play one of, if not the, greatest clubs in Ireland. The match lived up to expectations with tries scored by both teams and the lead switching back and forth. HBHS took the lead in the dying minutes of the game and a strong defensive effort held out the big Blackrock forwards from our line to finish the match at 26-22.

We then flew to Cardiff, Wales where we travelled to Llanelli, a town just outside of Swansea with a proud rugby tradition and who famously beat the All Blacks 9 – 3 in 1972. Here we played our fourth game against the runners-up in the Welsh College competition, Coleg Sir Gar.

Coleg Sir Gar Match Report:

This match saw us play a hungry Coleg Sir Gar side that were gutted to finish as runners-up in their own competition and were looking for some payback. They were a big, strong side and the score was very tight





at half time. However, once again the HBHS fitness was the difference and the impact of the reserve players saw a second half momentum shift with the final score a 39-19 victory.

We also experienced many great places and got an insight into Welsh rugby. We toured the Millennium Stadium and performed our school haka on the field, had a training session on the famous Cardiff Arms Park as well as a tour around the Welsh Rugby Union facilities. It was a privilege to visit these places and get a sense of the history and significance of the game in Wales.

of his term we caught up with our middle of distance running champion Isaiah

Priddey to find out how the summer of 2016 has gone for him. We asked him the questions and here he is in his own words...

escribe your 2016 season so far. What have been the highlights? What are you most pleased with?

At the beginning of the year (which was the end of the track season) I ran in the Senior Men's Porritt Classic 1500m and won in a personal best time of 3:52.3 minutes. Also, just before Christmas, I went to Timaru for the New Zealand Secondary Schools Track and Field competition and won both the 3km and the 1500m in a record time of 3:57minutes.

hat was your build-up like for the World Championships? What was a typical day or week of training?

The build-up was very short and hard as we just came off track training which is a lot easier than cross country, and the World Champs was basically the first cross country race!

hat was it like in Hungary? Where were you staying and what really stood out for you?

Once the race was over we got to do some sightseeing, but unlike the race, every other day was cold and wet. We were staying in one very large hotel with every team (approximately 23). Some of the stand-out things would have been the river cruise where we saw the parliament building and concert hall.

escribe the race itself. What were the conditions like?

The weather was almost perfect for racing, although coming from London the temperature felt far too hot. We were happy with the course because it was very flat but we found 300m of the 1600m course was gravel and we quickly discovered just how that felt to run on, and it wasn't good. There were also a lot of potholes which were poorly covered over.

(a) was the outcome of the race? How did you feel?

I finished 16th. I was very pleased with the result as it is very different to races in New Zealand where you know what position you will finish in, so being so close to the top ten

in the world was very pleasing.

o, where to now? What's coming up and what's on the horizon?

I have recently qualified for the Australian Cross Country Championships where I will aim to finish in the Top 10. I'm really hoping to get very close to, if not, in the Top 5.

nd long term?

Commonwealth Games and if I compete in them, I want to qualify for the 1500m in the 2024 Olympics.

We thank Isaiah for sharing his experiences with us and wish him every success as he heads to Canberra, Australia in August.







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WORLD CHAMPION CAILEN CALKIN

near 10 student Cailen Calkin recently returned from Colombia as a three time World Champion in BMX Racing. He tells us in his own words about this experience and exactly what he did to win back his World title...

On May 14th we departed New Zealand to start another adventure across the world at the BMX World Championships. We first flew to Houston, Texas and later on moved to New Orleans for a little holiday to start our trip off. We touched down in Medellin, Colombia on the 18th of May feeling a little unsure about what to expect in this country. Over the days leading up to the Worlds we travelled to different BMX tracks to get some riding in and also toured around this amazing country. It was a totally new experience to see the way the Colombians live and how different it is to life back in New Zealand.

When it came to race day, I felt confident and ready to race. We got to the track and we were told there was a four hour delay due to track damage caused by the rain the previous night. While we waited in the pits, track workers (including Dad and four others kiwis who were authorised to help) got to work to try and repair the damage Mother Nature had done to the track. After the track was back to its normal condition, the sun was out and racing was ready to get under way, but this time there were to be only two qualifying motos (qualifying races) instead of three because of the delay.

In my two motos I dominated, coming first followed by another first. I then moved onto the 1/8ths finals and in this you had to finish in the top 4 spaces to move onto the next final. After making a strong start, I finished first qualifier for the guarter finals. In this race I had to face the European Champion and the current World Champion. Not having the best start in the race and banging elbows down the ramp with another competitor set me back to fourth place, a risky position to be in. I ended up finishing fourth which meant I moved onto the semifinals and sure enough, I faced the World Champion again. This time I was out wide in lane 8 because of my placing in the previous race. I had a better start, still not perfect, but good enough, I came out strong and could have cut him off but chose to play it safe. Also if I stayed behind him, I could see his



lines and where I was faster than him. I finished second which meant I had the fourth lane pick in the final.

I wanted my World Title back more than anything at this stage, it was the only thing that I wanted. I felt safe out in the lessfavoured outside lanes. I gambled on being fast enough to overcome the increased distance of lane 8 and on being able to get across in front of all seven riders to claim the all-important inside line into turn one, against being relaxed out wide where the chances of being cut off if you "miss" the gate are virtually zero. So with the fourth pick for lanes, I went to the least favoured lane and took 8. With no pressure out there, I nailed the gate, one of my best starts yet, and then it was a matter of laying down the power I have been working hard to get. I knew I had the fastest first jump technique and once we got over the back of that, I had made my way across to about lane 4 and only had a couple of riders to deal with.

Ross, the reigning World Champion, and I came together over the back of the second jump and he attempted to push out at me and hold the inside but I had made up my mind that I was taking the corner or crashing doing it. You can feel that mindset and attitude from another rider and he felt it from me, he hesitated and the corner was mine. The trick from here, in any big race, is to stay relaxed and focused, to call on all of

your instincts and training to finish without making a mistake and blowing a World Championship title. I did this and held the celebration till the finish line. My legs "locked up" over the line and I couldn't stand up. The feeling I felt was indescribable, words do not explain how I felt. Everything I worked for had just paid off. Three time World Champion...

Thank you to everyone who supported me and backed me the whole way. I could not have done it without this help, so I thank you for everything you have done for me. Without you, I would not have been given this opportunity.

We thank Cailen for sharing this experience, and congratulate him once more on this extraordinary achievement. Kia Kaha.

NZIC WAIKATO BRANCH ANALYTICAL CHEMISTRY COMPETITION 2016

his annual event was held on Wednesday 15th June. Invitations were sent to schools in the wider Waikato/Bay of Plenty region to send teams of four students to the University for the day to carry out an analysis.

A total of 22 teams competed in the event.

The task was to analyse a sample of BaCl2. nH2O using a gravimetric procedure for Ba2+and a volumetric method for Cl-. This allowed the value of n to be calculated in the empirical formula by difference. This was a demanding task in the time available but some excellent results were achieved.

The competition allowed enthusiastic Year 13 chemists to spend a day in the University laboratories working on an experiment that would be beyond the resources of their schools.

Rivalry was fierce but the main emphasis was on enjoying the experience and meeting students from other schools.

For the fourth year in a row, a team from Hamilton Boys' High School won the competition and another team from the school also gained third place.


