GATEWAY PROGRAMME 2016

The Gateway Programme at HBHS has been a great success for many of our Year 12 and 13 students this year. We had 68 students involved in the programme, all of whom have been placed with an employer in their area of industry-related interest. The Gateway Programme provides 'structured workplace learning' for the students who had an idea of a possible future job or career they wished to explore. The programme offered the senior students 10 days of unpaid work experience (one day per week) to go hand in hand with studying industry-related credits towards NCEA qualifications. The range of industries included: Building, Equine, Arboriculture, Engineering, Automotive, Plumbing, Agriculture, Electrical, Sport and Recreation, Aviation, Retail (The Redshirts & Blue Shirts Programme), Barbering and Hospitality. As well as their work placement the students also attended a two-day Health and Safety course, a First Aid Course and a Workplace Drug Education Seminar. Some students extended their study by attending short courses at Fairview Educational Services, Varda Hairdressing School and the New Zealand Institute of Sport.

14 of our students have successfully gained apprenticeships directly from their work placement through the Gateway Programme this year. We would like to congratulate the following boys on their achievements:

Our long-time Japanese teacher Mrs Yuri Laaper leaves at the end of this year, after teaching the Japanese language on and off at HBHS since 1982. At that time there were only three or four Japanese people in Hamilton, let alone teachers, so Mrs Laaper found herself in a role she had never actually planned for. HBHS and HGHS led the way in teaching Japanese, and gradually other schools followed suit. Japanese teachers were very much pioneers in that they had to contend with writing Japanese script on chalkboards, and they spent hundreds of hours at home having to make their own resources, activities and games to help students come to grips with a very different language and culture. Highlights for Mrs Laaper have been some of the extraordinarily talented students she has taught in her time here, as well as trips to Japan and the always appreciated Japanese restaurant visits. Mrs Laaper is very much looking forward to her retirement, to new challenges and spending time in her garden and with her grandchildren.

Mr Graham Hardaker is one of HBHS's legends, famous for his "true stories", so we felt it was only fitting that his entry here was in his own words. We proudly present Mr Hardaker's sign-off in its (mostly) unedited glory. I started teaching in 1974, having already done various other industrial jobs. I taught for 11 years in the UK. In my first year of teaching, I taught Mr Nixon. Mr Nixon and I met up accidentally in a pub in Hamilton about 20 years later, and surprisingly, we both recognised each other. I arrived at HBHS in 1990 and have been here ever since. I have enjoyed the stability of teaching in one school for a long period. HBHS enjoyed a good reputation and I thought that being able to teach Physics would be advantageous to my teaching career. In 1998 I was appointed TCR Physics. I have coached various football teams, set up the lighting for various dramatic productions, and have been TCR for Road Cycling for a number of years. Setting up Electronics as a subject in this school has been my most obvious achievement. Initially the Polytechnic provided HBHS with Accreditation to teach Electronics. Eventually HBHS was accredited in its own right and the Electronics department grew in size. Currently, HBHS has the highest number of Electronics students in NZ, and is probably the best equipped. I've thoroughly enjoyed telling jokes and observing the expressions on the faces of students. Also, telling "true stories" and seeing students eyes light up. Next up for me is some pottering around in the garden with my partner, playing with my 2 year old grand-daughter and cycling the French Pyrenees... Mr Paul Evans started employment in 1979, and have subsequently served as an assistant teacher of English at HBHS with some intervals of departure for personal travel

and a period of employment at a private school. He has

served at HBHS under four successive headmasters. We asked him for his thoughts on this time, and are delighted to be able to share these:

Always the pathway has led me back predictably to the Waikato and an inevitable return to HBHS. During this period I have taught English at all levels of the curriculum with some time looking after the junior programme and later the development of the Year 12 course in the 'transitional' phase prior to the advent of NCEA. As an English teacher I have been involved in Debating and at one point the frequent excursions with students to major drama productions in Auckland at the Mercury. Beyond the classroom I was involved in gymnastics and looked after Chess at HBHS. I have also assisted with Soccer teams and latterly managing from a distance junior cricket teams. Over the course of the changing landscape of Education in a number of decades I have worked to navigate the nuances of the new approaches and deliver the curriculum in a way that is of some interest and relevance to a changing student clientele. More recently I have made a sideways step as a part time teacher. This then is perhaps a final transition. If life is a series of arrivals and departures on an uncertain and ambiguous journey, this exit demarcates a new beginning and time of fresh adventure and experiences. As the American poet Charles Bukowski noted, in the end "What matters is how you walk through

Mr Peter Skerman arrived at HBHS in 1981 as HOD of History and Social Studies. There were no faculties at that stage. He taught at Papatoetoe High School for four years, from 1972 - 1975 after leaving Teachers College in Auckland. He travelled for a year before returning to Auckland and taught at Kelston Boys' High School for five years as TCR of Geography. He took up the position of TCR History and Social Studies in the second term of 1981, replacing the previous TCR Neil Swindells who later became Headmaster of Opotiki College. He has no regrets at having had such a long spell in one school, and says it has been fascinating to watch the growth and evolution of HBHS into one of the best boys' schools in the country. At HBHS he has taught mainly History and Geography to all levels and Social Studies. Outside the classroom he has been involved with rugby coaching up to 1st XV level, surf life-saving in the early years and cricket. Personal highlights have included some excellent examination results in NCEA up to Level 3 and teaching some gifted scholars in the Cambridge examinations. In retirement he is looking forward to playing golf, fishing, and gardening. And finally, in the words of Mr James Hassall.. I have taught at HBHS for almost forty years and I thank the school for gifting me the freedom to teach in a way which has allowed words like kindness, care, love, hope, optimism, sincerity, intellectual challenge, thoughtfulness, interest and concern remain central in my life. I thank Susan, as my Headmaster, for her constant support, for her absolute unwavering, unafraid commitment to the best of all possible ideals and for her visionary and exceptionally able leadership of us all. I leave content and happily contemplate a future rich in grandchildren, gardens, books and many delightful hours pottering around in artists' studios and gallery stockrooms. Oh... and as my classes know, listening to **Bob Dylan!**
